Courante: a lively dance in triple meter, beginning with an anacrusis; -French style: a mixture of quarter notes (crotchets) and eighth notes (quavers), often with a mixture of measures in 3/2 and in 6/4, not so fast as the Italian corrente. The Italian corrente is in eighth notes (quavers) [sometimes in sixteenth notes (semiquavers)], and quite fast.

Most of the articulations are editorial, and we have added certain ornaments.
